July Complex (2 fires), Klamath NF. IMT 1 (Opliger). IMT is also managing the Log fire. Four miles east of Sawyers Bar, CA. Timber. Moderate fire behavior with group torching and short-range spotting. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations, road and area closures in effect.

Log, Klamath NF. Six miles west of Greenview, CA. Timber. Creeping and smoldering. Area closures in effect.

Happy Camp Complex (3 fires), Klamath NF. IMT 2 (Wakoski). One mile east of Happy Camp, CA. Timber, brush and grass. Active fire behavior with group torching. Numerous structures threatened.

* **Sandy Ridge**, Washington State Fire Marshal's Office. Started on private land eight miles east of Bickleton, WA. Brush and grass. Active fire behavior. Residences threatened. Area closure in effect.

* **Deception Complex**, Willamette NF. IMT 2 (Watts). Includes previously reported Staley Complex. Two miles west of Oakridge, OR. Timber. Creeping and smoldering with isolated torching. Road and area closures in effect.

South Fork Complex, Prineville District, BLM. Transfer of command from IMT 2 (Fillis) back to the local unit will occur on 8/24. IMT is also managing the Bald Sisters fire. Twenty miles southwest of John Day, OR. Timber, brush and grass. Creeping and smoldering with occasional torching. Structures threatened. Area closures in effect.

Bald Sisters, Malheur NF. Twelve miles east of Prairie City, OR. Timber. Smoldering. Area closure in effect.

Little Bridge Creek, Okanogan/Wenatchee NF. Transfer of command from IMT 1 (Lund) back to the local unit will occur on 8/25. IMT is also managing the Carlton Complex and the Upper Falls fire. Ten miles west of Winthrop, WA. Timber. Minimal fire behavior. Area closure in effect.

Carlton Complex, Northeast Region, DNR. Started on private land seven miles south of Twisp, WA. Timber, light logging slash, brush and grass. Smoldering with isolated torching. Precipitation occurred over the fire area yesterday.

Upper Falls, Okanogan/Wenatchee NF. Seventeen miles north of Winthrop, WA. Timber, light logging slash and grass. Creeping and smoldering. Area closure in effect.

Somers, Wallowa-Whitman NF. Transfer of command from IMT 2 (Kidd) back to the local unit will occur today. Fifteen miles east of Imnaha, OR. Timber and grass. Creeping and smoldering with isolated interior torching. Structures threatened.

Hansel Creek, Southeast Region, DNR. Transfer of command from IMT 1 (Schulte) back to the local unit will occur today. IMT is also managing the Duncan fire and Chiwaukum Complex. Eight miles south of Leavenworth, WA. Timber and grass. Interior creeping and smoldering. Numerous structures threatened. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

Duncan, Okanogan/Wenatchee NF. Fifteen miles northwest of Entiat, WA. Timber and grass. Interior creeping and smoldering. Numerous structures threatened. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

Chiwaukum Complex (2 fires), Okanogan/Wenatchee NF. Nine miles north of Stevens Pass, WA. Timber, light logging slash and brush. Minimal fire behavior. Numerous structures, railroad and energy infrastructure threatened. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

Snag Canyon, Southeast Region, DNR. Transfer of command from IMT 1 (Turman) back to the local unit will occur tomorrow. IMT is also managing the South Cle Elum Ridge fire. Started on private land 12 miles north of Ellensburg, WA. Timber, brush and grass. Minimal fire behavior. Area closure in effect.

South Cle Elum Ridge, Okanogan/Wenatchee NF. Seven miles southwest of Cle Elum, WA. Timber, logging slash and brush. Minimal fire behavior.

Haven Lake, South Puget Sound Region, DNR. Started on private land eight miles west of Skokomish, WA. Timber with heavy logging slash. No new information. Last report unless significant activity occurs.

Predictive Services Discussion: A strong upper level trough of low pressure over the Columbia Basin will be preceded by a cold front in the northern Rockies with showers and thunderstorms, as well as temperatures 10 to 20 degrees below normal. On the west side of this trough, it will be dry and breezy over Oregon and the western Great Basin. Showers and thunderstorms associated with a closed low pressure system in Arizona will produce wet thunderstorms for the central Rockies and Four Corners region. A stationary front from the central Plains to the Ohio Valley will be a focus for thunderstorms in the eastern U.S., while the southern Plains will remain hot and dry under a ridge of high pressure aloft.

DRIVING SAFETY

Vehicles/Roads Category

Driving is one of the most hazardous things we do because we literally perform the task hundreds of times in the course of our daily lives we tend to take it for granted. Based on recent accident trends, vehicle accidents are the source of more deaths and serious injuries to wildland firefighters than any other single cause.

- To be a safe driver you have to *want* to be one. Take a good hard look at your driving habits. Are you training yourself to do the right things the right way, like fastening your seat belt, checking your mirrors, and maintaining safe following distances?
- Inattentiveness is a major contributing factor in motor vehicle accidents within the wildland firefighting community. Since the average adult attention span is 15-20 minutes we must develop techniques that allow us to refocus our attention on our driving.
- Many things can lure our attention away from our driving such as: fatigue, eating and drinking, reading directions and maps, writing, cell phone and radio use, conversation within the vehicle and music.
 - ✓ Drive only when you are well rested and alert and avoid driving during the hours of 10:00 PM and 6:00 AM. Take a 10 to 15 minute break after every 2 hours.
 - ✓ Practice situational awareness; be aware of what is happening in front, behind, and on both sides of your vehicle.
 - ✓ Never drive when taking medications that make you drowsy.
 - ✓ Delegate navigation and communication to a passenger or pull over.
 - ✓ By constantly moving your vision, checking mirrors and distant road conditions, you can avoid highway hypnosis and daydreaming.
 - ✓ Avoid eating or drinking while driving.
 - ✓ When talking with passengers, keep your eyes on the road and both hands on the steering wheel. Avoid serious or argumentative conversations.
 - ✓ Do not be in a hurry, be patient.
- Safe driving starts with a safe vehicle. Something as simple as under-inflated tires can have serious consequences. Before operating any vehicle, do a walk-around to look for potential problems, make sure the lights and blinkers work, and adjust your seat and mirrors. If it is the first time you have driven the vehicle, make yourself aware of where everything is.
